

## **TEACHING AND RESEARCH**

The Annual Fund also helps us support the brilliant, but costly, tutorial system.

Tutorials are at the heart of our student's learning, and they uniquely prepare them for life after College. The Fund provides urgent funding not covered by the endowment or fees.

The tutorial system teaches students academic rigour and intellectual curiosity, two skills that are invaluable for their future careers. Every year the Annual Fund takes the pressure off funding for this important, but expensive, form of learning.

The tutorial system is the most distinctive part of the teaching students receive at Oxford. History undergraduates across the years are typically taught in tutorial groups of two or three. While Faculty lectures and classes complement this study, the tutorial remains central to students' time here. It constitutes the key mode



of teaching all the way from the broadest of survey or 'outline' papers they study from day one, to the highly specialised dissertations they each write in their final year (for which they receive one-to-one tutorials with a specialist in their chosen area). The format allows tutors to tailor our teaching to the full spectrum of student interests and abilities. In tutorials, we can push students to think further and deeper about historical questions and encourage them to make connections with other areas of their study. At its best, the tutorial system produces sophisticated thinkers that can reflect on the nuances of an individual topic, critically judge competing perspectives, and explore the wider implications of their arguments – skills that are arguably now more valuable to society than ever before.
