Report on the 2022 Admissions Round (new admissions process implemented)

Overall picture

2141 applications were received for approximately **240** undergraduate places this year (excluding – senior status applications). There were approximately **8.92** applicants per available place.

(54 Senior status applications, applications are separate from other applications)

666 were invited to interview for Law, equating to 2.8 per place.

240 offers were made: 192 for Jurisprudence and 48 for Law with Law Studies in Europe.

Broken down by course:

1780 applications for Law alone were received. 560 candidates were interviewed.

361 applications for LSE alone were received. 106 candidates were interviewed. 48 offers were made.

10 Colleges participated in the Open Offer Scheme, making **10** offers between them. Colleges making Open Offers are:

Law/LSE has an application to interview success rate of **31.1%**, an interview to offer success rate of **36.03%**, with an application to offer success rate of **11.20%**.

Law alone has an application to interview success rate of **31.46%**, an interview to offer success rate of **34.28%**, with an application to offer success rate of **10.78%**.

LSE alone has an application to interview success rate of **29.36%**, an interview to offer success rate of **45.28%**, with an application to offer success rate of **13.29%**.

Second College Interviews

All colleges took part in 2nd or 3rd interviews.

215 Law/LSE candidates received a second interview at another college. Of these, **118** were made an offer. **25** of these offers were made by College 2. Overall, **10.4%** of offers were made by College 2.

Senior Status (not included in stats)

54 Senior status applications were received. 24 were interviewed, 7 were made an offer.Senior status candidates had an application to interview rate of 44%, an interview to offer rate of 34.28% and an application to offer success rate of 12.96%.

11 Senior status candidates were second interviewed at another college. Of these, **4** were made an offer. **1** of these offers was made by College 2. Overall, **14%** of offers were made by College 2.

The Admissions Process

This year the law faculty implemented several changes to the admissions process following the Admissions Process Review. All applications were considered college blind by the Faculty Selection Committee and a shortlist produced, to which colleges then added candidates by requesting to rescue deselected candidates (both from the Rescue List and from the general pool of deselected candidates).

Centralised shortlisting

A Faculty Selection committee (FSC) comprised one representative from 15 of the 31 Colleges involved in the Law Admissions Process, and a further presentative from Harris Manchester College. Next year the remaining 16 Colleges will provide 1 member each to sit on the committee.

Centralised LNAT Marking

The LNAT was marked using No More Marking, a comparison marking system that anonymised LNAT essays and allowed markers to compare 2 essays at a time. The system created a numerical score once the essays were assessed.

Distribution graphs of marks (separated into Access bands) for MC and essay were distributed to Law Admitting Tutors.

The Shortlisting Ranking formula was updated, ranking was performed pre-shortlisting based on contextual GCSE information (where available) and LNAT Multiple Choice and LNAT Essay. Candidate were then divided into Categories 1 - 3, with each category holding 240 candidates (number of available places this year) except for Category 3.

Opportunity Oxford – Bridging Programme

There were 272 Opportunity Oxford eligible candidates, of whom 117 were interviewed. Of these, 21 Opportunity Oxford offers. 18 Opportunity Oxford eligible candidates were made <u>standard</u> offers. 1 candidate was given special consideration for an Opportunity Oxford offer although not flagged as eligible.
