The Choir of Somerville College, Oxford

Will Dawes: Director of Chapel Music

Somerville College Choir is made up of 32 singers from Somerville College and the wider Oxford community. Consisting of choral scholars and volunteers, the choir meets twice weekly and is the only Oxford College Choir that sings primarily secular events. The focal point of each week is Choral Contemplation which takes place every Sunday evening in term and plays a central role in College life.

They are thrilled to be back in the USA for the first time in nearly 10 years.

Members of the Choir also sing in the National Youth Choir, the Rodolfus Choir, Gabrieli Roar, Genesis Sixteen, and Schola Cantorum of Oxford, and former members can be found at various music colleges, and as part of VOCES8.

Recent highlights include workshops with Ben Parry (Former director of the National Youth Choir), the King's Singers, Giles Underwood, Dame Emma Kirkby (an alumna of the college), and Rachel Nicholls, performances of Bach St John Passion and Mozart Requiem with the Instruments of Time and Truth, as well as a concert for refugees from Afghanistan with the Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra, a gig with the Basin St Brawlers, Rossini Petite Messe Solennelle, and Handel Solomon with Imperial College Chamber Choir and the Oxford Baroque Players. The choir was the first Oxford College Choir to tour to India engaging in outreach with multiple charities and performing three concerts to capacity audiences in Mumbai and Goa in 2018, revisiting the country in 2023.

The choir's next Album 'Divine Light', choral music associated with India will be released in July 2025, and they'll record an album of the works of upcoming UK composer Christopher Churcher in June 2025.

He is a graduate of Edinburgh University and the Royal Academy of Music where he studied Choral Conducting and Singing. He is an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music, and has worked with choirs all over the world, including in Auckland, Shenzhen, Mumbai, Guanajuato, Ramallah, and numerous venues across the USA.

He was the founding Director of Frideswide Voices, has directed the BBC Singers, worked as Chorusmaster for the Aurora Orchestra, and next year will work with the Netherlands Radio Choir for the first time.

Will started singing aged 4 as part of the Berkshire Young Musicians Trust and was then a chorister at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. He is now active as a consort singer and for 16 years was a member of the internationally acclaimed vocal ensemble Stile Antico, performing regular concerts at Wigmore Hall, Boston Early Music Festival, and at the BBC Proms, was nominated for three GRAMMYs (including performing at the 2020 awards ceremony in Madison Square Garden) and winning numerous international awards. He is a former Lay Clerk of Christ Church, Oxford, and has sung with The Sixteen, the BBC Singers, Collegium Vocale Gent, Dunedin Consort, Gabrieli Consort, and Polyphony.

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
